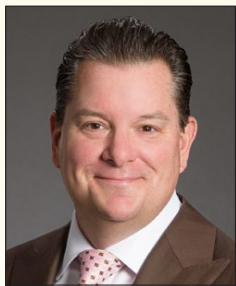

Prior to the meeting, Board members received a copy of the Environmental Scan prepared by SOLID. The purpose of the

Environmental Scan was to provide a better understanding of the Board's performance in the following four goal areas: (1) Licensing and Examinations, (2) Consumer Protection and Enforcement, (3) Communication and Customer Service, and (4) Administrative Services.

Leading up to this strategic planning session, interviews with Board members and Board staff were conducted to assess upcoming potential challenges and opportunities. An online and anonymous external stakeholder survey was also conducted in June 2025, with nearly one thousand (1,000) responses received.

Some of these strategic initiatives are already underway, such as a reassessment and reallocation of Board committees to help promote efficient and effective Board actions.

Finally, we at the Board are dedicated to serving California's dental consumers. This service is deeply rooted in consumer protection. The spirit of our work is shrouded in the guideposts of the Board's mission and vision, which state:

Did You Know?—Notes From the Enforcement Unit

The Board’s Enforcement Unit handles cases involving a wide range of complaints. There are, however, some violations more commonly encountered than others. This is an attempt to provide a quick resource to increase awareness and avoid future violations of the statutes listed below.

Inspection of Books, Records, and Premises

Business and Professions Code (BPC) section 1611.5, subdivision (a), permits the Board to inspect the books, records, and premises of any dentist it licenses and the licensing documents, records, and premises of any dental assistant it permits in response to a complaint they have violated any law or regulation that constitutes grounds for disciplinary action by the Board. Subdivision (b) of this section of the BPC makes the failure to allow an inspection or any part thereof a ground for suspension or revocation of the license or permit in accordance with BPC section 1670.

Felony Charges, Criminal Convictions, and Disciplinary Actions

California Code of Regulations (CCR), title 16, section 1018.05, subdivision (b) requires a licensee to report to the Board the bringing of an indictment or information charging a felony against them, the conviction of any felony or misdemeanor, and any disciplinary action taken by another professional licensing entity or authority of this state or another state or an agency of the federal government of the United States, within 30 days.

CCR, title 16, section 1008, subdivision (b) requires a licensee to report to the Board if they have been convicted of any violation of the law, omitting traffic infractions under \$1,000, not involving alcohol, dangerous drugs or controlled substances, and any disciplinary action against any other license they may hold, as a condition for renewal.

Provide Dental Records Upon Board Request with Authorization

Business and Profession Code section 1684.1, subsection (a) (1) requires a licensee to comply with a Board request for the dental records of a patient that is accompanied by written authorization of the patient or the patient’s representative for release of records to the Board, within 15 days of receiving the request and imposes a civil penalty of \$250 per day for each day the after the fifteenth day, up to a maximum of \$5,000, unless the licensee is unable to provide the documents within the required time for good cause.



Registered Continuing Education Provider Permit Renewal

The Board registers providers of continuing education (CE) courses on topics related to dentistry. Such providers are issued a Registered Provider (RP) permit. Additional approval is required to offer the following mandatory CE courses: 2-hour Infection Control, 2-hour California Dental Practice Act, and 2-hour Responsibilities and Requirements of Prescribing Schedule 2 Opioid Drugs (dentists only).

RP permit holders must renew their permit every two years. To renew, visit the [BreEZe](#) website and log into your BreEZe account to locate the renewal transaction in the License Activities section. If you do not have a BreEZe account, select New User to create one. You will be prompted to attach the following documents and pay the \$325 renewal fee at the end of the transaction:

- A sample of the student Certificate of Completion issued to participants during the last renewal period.
- A [Continuing Education Provider Biennial Report](#) form.

The Certificate must include the following:

- The participant's name and license or permit number (if applicable).
- The name of the course completed.
- The name of the course provider.
- The Board-issued approval number.
- The 11-digit registration number for the course in the upper left-hand corner.
- The date(s) attended.
- The date or date range of completion of the course.
- The number of completed hours of the course.
- The number of units earned.
- A place for the licensee to sign and date, verifying their attendance.
- The signature of the course provider, director, administrator, or their designee.
- A statement that reads: "All the information contained on this certificate is truthful and accurate."

- A statement that reads: "Completion of this course does not constitute authorization for the attendee to perform any services that he or she is not legally authorized to perform based on his or her license or permit type."

The biennial report must include the following:

- The titles of all courses offered.
- The 11-digit registration numbers issued to each course.
- The number of units issued for each course.
- The dates of all courses offered.
- The name and qualifications of each instructor.
- A summary of the content of each course.

Note that the Board may randomly audit an RP or any course for which a complaint is received. You must retain your course records for 3 renewal periods (6 years).

Authority: BPC, section 1741, subdivision (e); CCR, title 16, section 1016, subsections (b)(1)(A)–(D), as applicable, (d), (e), (g), and (h).



Educational and Training Course Requirements for Unlicensed Dental Assistants

A dental assistant is an individual who, without a license, may perform basic supportive dental procedures as authorized by BPC section 1750.1 and CCR section 1085, under the supervision of a licensed dentist. BPC 1741(b) defines basic supportive dental procedures as procedures that have technically elementary characteristics, are completely reversible, and are unlikely to precipitate potentially hazardous conditions for the patient being treated.

Required Educational and Training Courses for the Unlicensed Dental Assistant:

- A Board-approved 8-hour Infection Control course
- A Board-approved 2-hour Dental Practice Act course
- Certification in Basic Life Support

Optional Educational and Training Courses for the Unlicensed Dental Assistant:

- Coronal Polish—To perform coronal polishing prior to licensure as a registered dental assistant, an unlicensed dental assistant shall complete a Board-approved coronal polishing course and obtain a certificate of completion. Prior to taking the coronal polishing course, the dental assistant shall provide evidence to the course provider of having completed a Board-approved, eight-hour infection control course and of holding a current, valid, basic life support certification.
 - ◊ The original or a copy of the current, valid certificate issued by a Board-approved radiation safety course provider shall be publicly displayed at the treatment facility where the dental assistant performs dental services.

It is important to verify with the provider that the information is up to date, as the program or course status may change.

Supervising Licensed Dentist Responsibilities:

- The supervising licensed dentist shall be directly responsible for determining the competence of the dental assistant to perform the basic supportive dental procedures.
- Coronal polishing procedures must be performed under the direct supervision and pursuant to the order, control, and full professional responsibility of a licensed dentist, who shall, at a minimum, evaluate each patient after coronal polishing procedures are performed by the dental assistant.

Employer Responsibilities:

- The employer shall inform the dental assistant of the educational requirements to maintain employment as an unlicensed dental assistant.
- The employer of a dental assistant shall be responsible for ensuring that the dental assistant has successfully completed a Board-approved, eight-hour course in infection control prior to performing any basic supportive dental procedures involving potential exposure to blood, saliva, or other potentially infectious materials.

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- The employer of a dental assistant shall be responsible for ensuring that the dental assistant who has been employed continuously or on an intermittent basis by that employer for one year from the date of first employment provides evidence to the employer that the dental assistant has already successfully completed, or successfully completes, all of the following within one year of the first date of employment: A Board-approved, two-hour course in the Dental Practice Act and current certification in basic life support issued by the American Red Cross, the American Heart Association, the American Safety and Health Institute, the American Dental Association's Continuing Education Recognition Program, or the Academy of General Dentistry's Program Approval for Continuing Education, in accordance with both of the following:
 - ◇ The employer of a dental assistant shall be responsible for ensuring that the dental assistant maintains certification in basic life support.
 - ◇ The employer shall maintain evidence for the length of the employment of the dental assistant at the supervising dentist's treatment facility to verify the dental assistant has met and maintained all certification requirements as dictated by statute and regulation.

Did You Know?—Notes from the Licensing and Examinations Unit

Additional Office Permit (AOP) Requirements—Important Reminder for California Dentists

California law requires dentists to obtain an Additional Office Permit (AOP) before opening or acquiring more than one practice location. Under California Code of Regulations, title 16, [sections 1045–1048](#), a dentist must apply to the Dental Board, pay the required fee, and obtain written approval before opening or acquiring an additional office.

An “additional place of practice” includes any dental office where dentistry is performed that increases the total number of locations where a dentist holds ownership, management authority, or control. This applies whether the office is obtained by purchase, reassignment, gift, inheritance, or other legal means. Even partial ownership or management rights may trigger the permit requirement. Simply leasing space does not constitute a proprietary interest unless the dentist also participates in managing or controlling the practice.

Additional Office Permits are issued to individual licensees, and each licensee who holds a proprietary interest in the practice or has the right to participate in management or control must apply separately for an AOP. Applications must include all required supporting documentation, including Partnership Agreements or Articles of Incorporation.

Additional Office Permits are location specific. A new application is required if the office location changes. However, if relocating within the same county, a licensee may request a transfer of the existing Additional Office Permit. Improper

transfers between licensees may result in termination of the privilege to operate that office.

There are limited exceptions that apply to AOPs, such as: Practicing in licensed health facilities, community care facilities, schools, or public institutions (including correctional facilities), approved nonprofit or governmental mobile units, or in the home of a non-ambulatory patient with proper medical documentation, does not constitute an additional place of practice under the statute.

Dentists who maintain more than one office assume full legal responsibility and liability for services rendered at each location, and each office must comply with the supervision requirements and prominently display the dentist's name, mailing address, telephone number, and dental license number where patients can easily see it.

Dentists considering expansion, acquisition, or relocation should ensure full compliance before making changes to avoid regulatory consequences. For more information, please visit the [Board's Contact Us page](#).





Licensing and Examinations Unit Highlight

Before becoming a licensed dentist, every dentist in California begins their journey with the Board’s Licensing and Examinations Unit (LEU). This team of licensing analysts plays a vital role in thoroughly and accurately reviewing each application received, ensuring compliance with all state requirements.

In the 2024–2025 fiscal year, the LEU processed 1,548 dental applications and 1,662 permit applications, supporting access to dental care while maintaining public safety standards. Most applications are submitted through the Board’s online portal, BreEZe, streamlining the process for both applicants and staff.

The LEU is transitioning to a paperless workflow to enhance efficiency and sustainability, and the move to electronic processing has already improved operations. Digital applications and document uploads through BreEZe allow staff to review materials more efficiently, reduce paper usage, and maintain centralized records.

Key benefits of the paperless transition include:

- Reduced environmental impact—Minimized paper usage and printing, helping lower the Board’s carbon footprint.
- Centralized document access—Records are securely stored and accessible electronically through BreEZe, allowing staff to retrieve and review documents quickly.
- Improved processing efficiency—Eliminates delays associated with printing, mailing, and manual filing, resulting in faster application review times.
- Digitized incoming mail—Physical mail is scanned and electronically uploaded to applicant records, ensuring accurate tracking and organization.
- Enhances record security and organization—Electronic files reduce the risk of misplaced documents and improve record management.

Although much of the LEU’s work happens behind the scenes, their meticulous attention to detail and unwavering commitment to public safety are essential to the Board’s mission: To protect and promote the health and safety of California consumers.

Paperless Process for the Complaint and Compliance Unit

The Board has been working to enhance processes, implement feedback, and improve efficiency throughout the Enforcement Division. Recently, the Board has begun the process of becoming paperless, specifically in the Complaint and Compliance Unit (CCU). Once implemented, this new process will allow all dental offices to submit complaint-related records via a secure link, avoiding delays in mail delivery.

By receiving records through the secure file link, CCU staff will be able to work with dental offices and obtain

records more quickly. This, in turn, will allow complaints to be processed efficiently. Once the secure file link has been finalized, all offices contacted by CCU staff to submit required records will be notified of the process.

The Board is excited to continue rolling this process out to other units in the Enforcement Division and is working diligently to improve processing times and implement stakeholder and consumer feedback.
